



Let's take a look at the difference between **already** and **yet**.

Already vs Yet

Already

It expresses that something happened **earlier** than we expected. It also suggests there is no need for repetition. In the Present Perfect Tense it usually goes before the main verb, but it can be placed at the end of the sentence to show more surprise.

(Expresa que algo ocurrió **antes** de lo esperado. También sugiere que no es necesario repetirlo. En el presente perfecto suele ir antes del verbo principal, pero puede colocarse al final de la frase para mostrar más sorpresa).

Examples

I've **already** watched that video. I don't want to watch it again. (Ya he visto ese video. No quiero volver a verlo).

She has been there **already**. (Ya ha estado allí).

Yet

It expresses that something that we expected **has not** happened. It's used in negative statements and questions. **Yet** is usually placed at the end of the sentence.

(Expresa que algo que esperábamos no ha ocurrido. Se utiliza en afirmaciones y preguntas negativas. Yet suele colocarse al final de la frase).

Examples

Have you eaten the apples **yet**? - (¿Ya te has comido las manzanas?).

She hasn't arrived **yet**. - (Todavía no ha llegado).
